Subject: Approval of Two Projects for Immediate Funding from American Rescue

Plan Act Funds

Recommendation:

That the Board of Commissioners approve immediate funding for the Bayshore Septic to Sewer Project and City-wide advertising and marketing campaign from American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds.

Background:

On December 7, 2021, the Board of Commissioners was presented with five projects proposed for immediate funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The Board approved two of those projects:

1. New Roof/Chiller System for Public Safety Building \$900,000

2. Mental Health Treatment/Crisis Intervention Counseling \$ 48,000 And Training – Public Safety

The other three projects were deferred until we obtained public input. I have taken one project off the list: Resurfacing/Restriping Court Street Parking Lot, Library Parking Lot and Cultural Center Parking Lot. The \$60,000 cost for this project will be absorbed into our General Fund Budget for this year.

I am proposing that the last two projects be approved for immediate funding from ARPA funds:

Water Sewer Infrastructure: Bayshore Septic to Sewer \$1,000,000
 This remains the number one staff proposed project for approval. The project has been supported by the Budget Advisory Committee and the Sustainability Committee. Residents were in the audience of the Town Hall meeting to support this project which will complete a 10-year process on Bayshore.

2. City Wide Advertising/Marketing Campaign \$ 100,000

These funds would assist businesses by bringing residents and tourist to Tarpon Springs. This was also brought up by the business community during the Town Hall meeting and was also endorsed by the Budget Advisory Committee. The timing is very important on this project so that additional advertising and marketing can begin with the off-season beginning after Easter.

Public Services Department ARPA Project Proposal: Septic to Sewer Conversion for the Remainder of Bayshore Drive Preliminary Project Estimate: \$750k - \$1.5M

Background

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") provides funding in several areas such as state and local aid. Eligible use of these funds specifically includes investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure

The City continues to prioritize the elimination of septic tanks through the expansion of City sewer infrastructure, particularly in areas of most beneficial impact. Areas with relatively high housing density, with soils that are less suitable for septic tanks, and that are located adjacent to water bodies are priority candidate areas. A technical evaluation was completed in 2000 that evaluated such areas in the City and a priority list was established. Several of the highest priority areas have already been completed with connection to City sewer infrastructure or are currently in the construction phase.

Bayshore Drive remains as a priority area. A portion of Bayshore Drive in the vicinity of DeSoto Drive has recently been connected to sewer subsequent to the construction of a lift station in the area associated with the development of Bayshore Heights.

Project Summary

The remaining areas to the northwest and south are proposed for this project as shown in Exhibit "A". Approximately 60 lots remain to be connected to sewer on Bayshore Drive. The City is currently initiating a detailed design of this project along with other priority areas of sewer expansion. The City through its design consultant will evaluate various alternatives to provide sanitary sewer service, through systems such as gravity sewer, a low-pressure system that utilizes individual (private) pump stations at each home, or some combination thereof. Site conditions such as land availability for any City lift station, existing utilities, and topography will dictate the most viable option.

Preliminary Cost Estimate

A preliminary cost estimate for constructing the sewer extension to the remaining portions of Bayshore Drive highlighted in Exhibit "A" is being provided for planning purposes. This estimate is prior to detailed site evaluation, selection of alternative, and design. Therefore, a preliminary cost estimate is being provided between \$750,000 to \$1.5 million depending on which alternative is selected. This cost will be further refined upon alternative selection, further field investigations and design initiatives.

Special Consent: ARPA Funds: Citywide Advertising/Marketing

The American Rescue Plan Coronavirus State & Local Fiscal Recovery Funds presents an opportunity for the city to address negative economic impacts and make investments in infrastructure. The business community was greatly impacted through shutdowns, and the Business Recovery Program provided \$1,000 grants to 155 businesses early in the pandemic. After businesses could reopen, many people locally and within the region continued sheltering at home, and tourists were non-existent.

Analysts with the St. Pete/Clearwater CVB (VSPC) in January 2021 estimated the tourism industry's annual economic impact was down \$2 billion from the prior fiscal year. With numbers rebounding, the city has an opportunity to assist its businesses through robust advertising and marketing efforts to attract more tourists and locals to the city. More people shopping and dining and buying services will increase the overall wealth of all the city's businesses.

A suggested amount of \$100,000 could be allocated to advertising/marketing efforts. The funds could be used within one year, or spread out up to four years, as ARPA projects are required to be completed by December 2026.


The dollars can be used for the key opportunities Tarpon Springs has each year: winter visitors – November through April and the vacationers – May through October with a sub-focus on family travel June through August.

The additional advertising/marketing dollars could include a multi-media mix of the following:

- Print brochure distribution at Welcome Centers / hotels; VSPC's Gulf to Bay ad; the panel ad on the FL Suncoast Map; any additional targeted ads in local / regional publications
- Digital geo-fenced digital ads; targeted ads on travel websites; create 30- and 15-sec. videos
- Continue Partner memberships Visit FL and Visit SPC and take advantage of their analytic data
- Billboards keep I-75 an I-4 billboards; possibly add local billboard by PIE airport; Wesley Chapel/New Tampa area; Dale Mabry; St. Pete Beach
- Jolly Trolley Advertising at beaches
- Television ads cable; Streaming TV ads such as You Tube TV, Hulu, etc.
- Social Media Facebook; Instagram; You Tube; Tik Tok

These are some ideas, and staff has also reached out to VSPC for possible collaboration. If approved, a plan would be developed and brought to the BOC.















ARPA - Which area would be your SECOND choice if the funds were to be used for INVESTMENTS IN INFRASTRUCTURE?





- Dr. Robinson: couple seawalls with living shorelines (biological approach) to reduce wave action, absorb CO2






